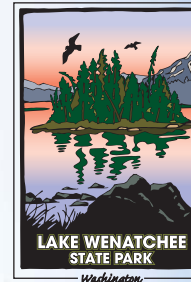


Things to remember

- Hours – 6:30 a.m. to dusk year round
- Winter schedule – Some campgrounds are closed during the winter, however winter camping is available in a designated area of the day use. Sno-Park permits are required during the winter recreation season. For a winter schedule and information about seasonal closures, visit www.parks.wa.gov or call the information center at (360) 902-8844.
- Wildlife, plants and all park buildings, signs, tables and other structures are protected; removal or damage of any kind is prohibited. Hunting, feeding of wildlife and gathering firewood on state park property is prohibited.
- One camping party is allowed per site. Maximum of eight people per campsite. Tents must be placed on designated tent pads to protect fragile vegetation.
- Campsites may not be held for other parties.
- Camping check-in time is 2:30 p.m., and check-out time is 1 p.m.
- Extra vehicle overnight - \$10 per night in designated area for each vehicle in excess of the one allowed per site. Does not apply to vehicle towed by a recreational vehicle.
- Pets must be on leash and under physical control at all times. This includes trail areas and campsites. Pet owners must clean up after pets on all state park lands.
- Quiet hours are 10 p.m. to 6:30 a.m.
- Engine-driven electric generators may be operated only between the hours of 8 a.m. and 9 p.m.

Welcome to Lake Wenatchee State Park

Lake Wenatchee State Park is a 489-acre camping park with 12,623 feet of waterfront on glacier-fed Lake Wenatchee and the Wenatchee River. The park is bisected by the Wenatchee River, creating two distinct areas – south park, which features areas for camping, swimming and horseback riding, and north park, with campsites in a less developed, forested section of the park and a quarter-mile walk from the lake. The park is a natural wildlife area, and visitors should be aware of the presence of bears and other natural dangers.

A concessionaire offers guided horse rides on more than five miles of trail in and around the forested park. Year-round recreation opportunities abound, including swimming, boating and hiking in the summer and cross-country skiing, snowplaying, showshoeing and sledding in the winter.

Overnight accommodations

The park offers several options for overnight stays year round. There are 155 standard campsites, 42 hookup campsites that accommodate RVs up to 40 feet long and two campsites that are accessible to people with disabilities. Campsites at the park are reservable for stays between May 15 and Sept. 15.

The park offers a group camp that accommodates 20 to 80 guests. Only tent camping is allowed in the group camp. Fees vary with size of the group.

Park history

During their annual migration long ago, Native American tribes stopped at Lake Wenatchee for a feast of clams and salmon before heading west to trade with coastal tribes. Nason Creek, called Umptanum Creek by Native Americans, is adjacent to the park. This was the location where Nason bragged that he and another Native American had killed two white men. This event was one of the noted causes of the Yakima Indian War.

Park amenities and facilities

Lake Wenatchee State Park offers several amenities and facilities to make your visit more enjoyable and comfortable, including:

- A group day-use kitchen shelter with accommodation for 20 to 50 guests and six picnic tables. Reservable by calling (888) CAMPOUT or (888) 226-7688.
- A group day-use kitchen shelter with accommoda-

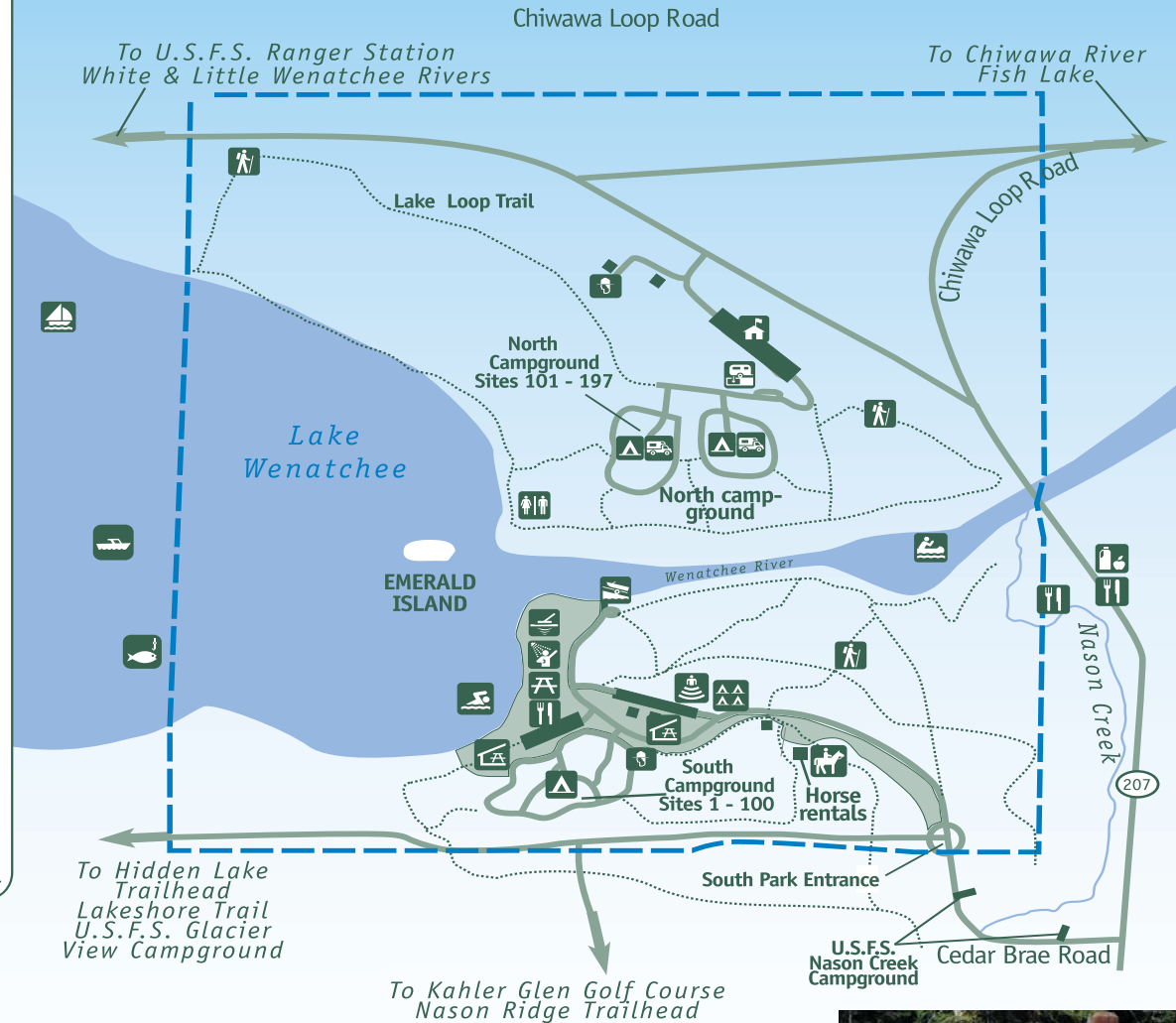
tions for eight to 12 guests is available first come, first served

- A boat ramp and 16 feet of dock
- A park store

- 40 kilometers of groomed cross-country ski trails,
