Things to remember

- Park hours 6:30 a.m. to dusk.
- Winter schedule Although most parks are open year round, some parks or portions of parks are closed during the winter. For a winter schedule and information about seasonal closures, visit www.parks.state.wa.us or call the information center at (360) 902-8844.
- · Wildlife, plants and all park buildings, signs, tables and other structures are protected; removal or damage of any kind is prohibited. Hunting, feeding of wildlife and gathering firewood on state park property is prohibited.
- Pets must be on leash and under physical control at all times. This includes trail areas and campsites. Pet owners must clean up after pets on all state park lands.



The Discover Pass is required for day visits to state parks and access to other state-managed recreation lands. The pass provides access to millions of acres of parks, wildlife areas, trails, natural areas and water-access sites. The annual pass is transferable between two vehicles.

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- Annual pass: \$30
- One-day pass: \$10 (transaction and dealer fees may apply)

Pacific Pines State Park, on the Long Beach Peninsula, offers the quintessential northwest day at the beach.

Dune grasses and knobby shore pines slope down to the wide, sandy Pacific Ocean shore. This 10-acre day-use park is ideal for flying kites, making sandcastles, fishing, crabbing,

clamming, spotting sea and shore birds, walking on the beach and watching the sunset.

Pacific Pines rounds out any trip around the Long Beach Peninsula, with its charming small towns and famous cranberry bogs. The park makes a great stop for romance, contemplation or family fun. Leashed dogs are also welcome to trot along on the beach with their owners.

Overnight accommodations

Although Pacific Pines is a day-use park, overnight accommodations are available at Cape Disappointment State Park with Cape Disappointment has 137 standard campsites, 60 full-utility sites, 18 partial-utility sites with water and electricity that accommodate RVs up to 45 feet long, five primitive hiker/biker campsites available first come first served, 14 yurts and three cabins. Camping is available year round at Cape Disappointment.
