
















For years a partnership between the INLC and WDFW has existed in managing properties along the eastern boundary of Glen Tana. The Washinton Department Wildlife's Waikiki Springs access site and the Waikiki Springs Nature Preserve currently provide over 200 acres of land open to the public for fishing access a

In 2021, WDFW was honored when the Spokane Tribe of Indians (STOI) cho Spokane River and our Waikiki Springs site for their educational and cultural Salmon. Moving forward the Spokane Tribe of Indians has identified the Lit the best location to reintroduce salmonids into the region's waters. For the past 20 years, Turnbull National Wildlife Refuge has partnered with the Inland Northwest Land Conservancy (INLC) to protect quality habitat adjacent to existing refuge lands. In recent years, this partnership has grown to include efforts to protect and enhance INLC properties through the Partners for Fish and Wildlife Program at Turnbull NWR. The Inland Northwest Land Conservancy has protected over 23,000 acres of land over the past 30 years, much of it high quality habitat that had been targeted for urban development.

In late 2020, INLC purchased a 94-acre parcel of land on the banks of the Little Spokane River that had been slated for development. The Partners program at Turnbull is currently working with INLC to restore 10 acres of Little Spokane River floodplain on the property that used to host a county sewage lagoon. The overall design of the project is to remove fill from the old sewage lagoon area and reconnect the Little Spokane River floodplain. This project will benefit important waterfowl and fish habitat on the river. To accomplish this project, eight groups have partnered to secure funds to complete the restoration project in 2024. There are 5 other restoration projects currently being undertaken on adjacent protected properties by tribal, county, and state agencies. These projects aim to improve water quality in the Little Spokane River, provide enhanced habitat for local wildlife, and encourage public stewardship of the river.

The Inland Northwest Land Conservancy recently announced they have entered into a purchase agreement to acquire an additional 1,060 acres of land within this unique drainage, immediately adjacent to their 2020 purchase. This purchase would include nearly 2 miles of cold-water fish habitat on the Little Spokane River, a known cougar denning site, and known populations of moose, elk, migratory
