





Habitat for eagles, moose, migratory birds, coyote, cougar, beaver & more





Trail and Habitat Connectivity:

between Glen Tana, INLC and WDFW Waikiki Springs property








Long-term Park Boundary




What does the Landscape tell us?

Topography is steep in the uplands area, making multi-use trail construction difficult.






What do we know about the wildlife and habitat?
